Subject: Ratification by the General Faculty of the Amendments to the Florida State Constitution

The Florida State University Constitution Article VIII, Amendments, Paragraph 1, "Amendments to this Constitution shall become effective when (1) approved by a two-thirds vote of the Faculty Senate, (2) ratified by a majority vote of the members of the General Faculty who are eligible for election to the Faculty Senate and who vote on the proposal, and (3) approved by the Board of Regents."

The Faculty Senate adopted twenty-five (25) amendments on January 18, 1978; approximately 930 ballots were sent to eligible faculty members; and 122 plus two blank ballots were returned.

Attached is a copy of the amendments and the results of the votes. In summary, the amendments were approved as follows:



- I. Adoption of GE01110 as a course meeting the Liberal Studies social sciences requirement.
- II. That the following be adopted relative to high school student regulations in the Administrative Procedures Act:

Florida public high school students, prepared to undertake advanced work not available in the high school curriculum, may be permitted to register in college courses for high school credit. Although exempt from the payment of registration fees, such students will be required to pay an amount per hour as required under bond and trust obligations. High school students will be accepted only upon the recommendation of their principals in courses not available at their high schools, if space is available in the classes. Each class taken by a high school student must be approved by the instructor and the Dean of Basic Studies before registration will be permitted. Certification by the high school must be turned in with the fee card at registration. There is a \$5.00 fee for student identification cards.

### Graduate Policy Committee Recommendations

#### I. Policy Governing Graduate Faculty Membership

(Scored words indicate proposed deletions; underlining indicates additions proposed by the Graduate Policy Council to the current policy as approved by the Faculty Senate on October 15, 1969, and amended on February 19, 1975.)

GRADUATE FACULTY. Any member of the Instructional Faculty of the university may be considered for membership on the Graduate Faculty. Membership is determined on the basis of the individual's function and qualifications.

Because of the functional character of the designation, appointments are not necessarily indicative of qualifications. It is quite possible, for example, for an individual fully qualified to direct doctoral dissertations not to be so designated for the simple reason that the doctorate is not offered in his field.

On the other hand, no individual may be authorized to discharge functions for which he is not qualified. Thus, on occasions, hopefully rare, it may be necessary to forego certain functions for lack of qualified personnel.

Two categories of functional responsibility and authority exist on the Graduate Faculty: (1) Master's Directive and (2) Doctoral Directive.

The minimum functional authority, attendant qualifications and procedures of appointment for each category are elaborated below:

- A. Master's Directive. Members of the Graduate Faculty with "Master's Directive Responsibility" are authorized to:
  - (1) teach graduate-level courses,
  - (2) serve as Major Professor for master's degree students, and
  - (3) serve on Supervisory Committees for doctoral students, provided each such Committee includes at least three members with Doctoral Directive Status.

Graduate Policy Committee Recommendations continued:

Subject to consideration of special circumstances, minimum qualifications are completion of a doctorate or its equivalent and proven ability to conduct scholarly research and publish in reputable media or to perform equivalent scholarly or creative works.

Departments will determine criteria and procedures for appointments, subject to approval of the dean of the college or school. Names of new appointees will be sent to the Dean of Graduate Studies and Research for confirmation, with the advice and consent of the Graduate Policy Council.

B. Doctoral Directive. Members of the Graduate Faculty with "Doctoral Directive Status" are authorized to perform all functions appropriate to graduate education.

Subject to consideration of special circumstances, the minimum qualifications for appointment are: (1) attainment of recognized professional stature in the discipline by virtue of substantial postdoctoral or equivalent scholarly or creative work and (2) experience in the supervision of graduate students.

Colleges or schools will determine criteria for appointments, subject to the approval of the Dean of Graduate Studies and Research, with the advice and consent of the Graduate Policy Council. All departmental nominations for appointment will be reviewed by a school- or college-wide committee. That committee's recommendations for acceptance or rejection of nominations will be sent to the dean of the school or college for confirmation. Names of new appointees will be sent to the Dean of Graduate Studies and Research for confirmation, with the advice and consent of the Graduate Policy Council.

Appointments to the Graduate Faculty in this category will be for five years only, and will be reviewed in the fifth year. Appointments will be renewed only if the faculty member's teaching and research have continued to be of at least the quality that justified the original appointment. The procedure for renewing an appointment will be the same as that used in originally making it.

No graduate student of this institution may be appointed to its graduate faculty. Nor may a graduate student have primary teaching responsibilities in any graduate course except by specific approval of the dean of the college or school with a report of the appointment and its justification to the Dean of Graduate Studies and Research. Under no circumstances may a graduate student be appointed as a member of another graduate student's advisory and examining committee.

## II. Satisfactory-Unsatisfactory Course Option.

(Note: Underlining below indicates additions; scoring indicates deletions.)

With the permission of the major professor or chair-person of the student's major department, a student may enroll in as many as nine quarter hours during the master's degree program or up to fifteen quarter hours during the doctoral program on a Satisfactory-Unsatisfactory basis. A student's registration under the "S-U" option must be indicated on the proper form to the University Registrar from the major professor or chairperson of the student's major department and eligibility certified by the office of the Registrar by the end of the official change of schedule period. A student may change to a regular grade (A,B,C...) basis during the first four weeks of the quarter.

"The foregoing restrictions on the "S-U" option do not apply to courses normally offered on the basis of the "S-U" grading system, including courses in the College of Law for students of other graduate programs. Such hours are exempt from the total stipulated as permissible in the preceding paragraph.

"In individual study, thesis, dissertation, recital, supervised research, and internship credit, as well as for courses taken on the "S-U" option, the assigned grade will be "S" (Satisfactory) or "U" (Unsatisfactory). Although only course hours with a grade of "S" will be credited toward a degree, the "S" and "U" grades are not used in determining grade averages for admission to candidacy or for conferral of a degree."

At its meeting of March 6, 1978 the Graduate Policy Council reconsidered the "Recommended Changes for the Section on Satisfactory-Unsatisfactory Course Option (1977-1978 University Catalog)" as outlined in the attached copy of page 7 of the Faculty Senate Minutes for December 14, 1977. The Council made no changes in its earlier recommendations and is hereby resubmitting a request that the changes be placed on a Senate agenda in the near future.

Deletion of the phrase "eligibility certified by the Office of the Registrar by the end of the official change of schedule period" seems to be the issue. By way of explanation the phrase was included in the catalog material to offer an opportunity to warn a student on probation that by failing to take graded courses he is not improving his grade point average. The Council thought it appropriate to delete the phrase and let the student assume responsibility for adhering to the rule.

Faculty Senate Minutes  
April 19, 1978

- I. The Faculty Senate met in regular session on Wednesday, April 19, 1978, at 3:35 p.m. in Moore Auditorium. Mr. Gregg Choppin, Senate President, presided.

The following members were absent: Alan Bayer, Mark Berkley, Lynne Billard, Richard Bishop, Donna Blake, Amy Brown, Ray Burggraf, Janet Burroway, Judy Coryell, Arthur Cox, Menno Dinkelman, Clarence Edney, John Elam, Harold Fletcher, Walter Forehand, Marc Freeman, Joseph Jacobs, Walter James, James Jones, Roger Kaufman, Joseph Lannutti, John Larson, John Lunstrum, Clifford Madsen, Paul Nelson, David Rasmussen, J. R. Robarts, Clarence Smith, Nancy Smith, Robert Stobbe, Charles Wellborn, Janet Wells, and Paul Wilkens.

The minutes of the March 15, 1978 meeting of the Faculty Senate were approved as recorded and disseminated.

II. Adoption of the Agenda

Mrs. Norejane Hendrickson moved the adoption of the published agenda with the following changes and additions:

1. Move the State University System Faculty Senate Council report by Jim Pitts to item 1 under new business.
2. The Graduate Policy Committee report will be given by Peter Dalton and Eugene Kaelin instead of Steve Roady.
3. Under Unfinished Business add a "Resolution on Freedom of Speech" by Francis Townsend.
4. Under New Business change item 1 to 4; change item 2 to 5; new item 2 is a "Resolution on the University Sabbatical Committee" by Fred Standley; add item 3, nominations of candidates from the Senate Floor for (a) the University Sabbatical Committee, (b) the Grievance Committee, and (c) the Professional Relations and Welfare Committee; and under item 5, "Implication to Higher Education of Constitutional Revision", the report will be given by Pat Dore.

The motion was seconded and adopted.

III. Report of the Steering Committee

Mrs. Norejane Hendrickson, on behalf of the Steering Committee, presented the following report:

1. "The chairpersons from the Graduate Policy and Undergraduate Policy Committees met with the Senate Steering Committee as planned. Both chairpersons stated that their work was progressing well. Both spoke of their appreciation for the

cooperation received from committee members and other faculty, who were not members, but who were invited to serve on review or sub-committees."

"One chairperson expressed concern over the amount of time it takes a faculty member to do quality work on committee assignments. This person felt that such work is vital to the University and yet, heavy service assignments allow a faculty member little time for research and other professional achievements. Since certain departments, colleges, or schools give less merit consideration for service than they do for research, service oriented faculty may be handicapped in meeting merit criteria."

2. "The president of the Senate has appointed the ad hoc committee to monitor the Common Course Numbering System and to evaluate its effectiveness. The membership of the Committee is as follows:

Shirley Aaron, Library Science; Joseph Allaire, Modern Languages; Bruce Bickley, English; Ron Clark, Chemistry; Robert Kalin, Education; Tom King, Communication; Ralph McWilliams, Mathematics, Chairman; Persis Rockwood, Business; Jack Swartz, Music."

3. The Senate Steering Committee is implementing the new Senate By-Laws for the election of committees which is the reason for the addition to the agenda to provide for nomination of candidates from the Senate floor at its April meeting."
4. "The Steering Committee met with President Sliger and Vice-President Lawton to discuss the agenda."
5. "Charles Rockwood and Jim Pitts were our representatives at the April meeting of the State University System Faculty Senate Council. Jim Pitts will report on the meeting later today."

#### IV. Amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws

Mr. Fred Standley reported that the proposed By-Laws had been passed by the Faculty Senate at the January 18, 1978 meeting. He reported also that there was a 10% return on the ratification ballots for the amendments to the Constitution, however, all the proposed amendments were ratified and have been forwarded by the President to the Board of Regents.

Mr. Charles Rockwood moved to delete the words "functions and" in the second sentence of the first paragraph and to delete the next four paragraphs.

The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mr. Fred Standley moved to amend the third from the last paragraph by deleting the period after "reviewed by a school- or college-wide committee" and adding the words "or a committee outside the department designated for that purpose."

The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mrs. Margaret Menzel moved to delete the second sentence in the last paragraph beginning with "except".

The motion was seconded and adopted.

The original motion as amended was adopted.

Appointments to the Graduate Faculty in this category will be for five years only, and will be reviewed in the fifth year. Appointments will be renewed only if the faculty member's teaching and research have continued to be of at least the quality that justified the original appointment. The procedure for renewing an appointment will be the same as that used in originally making it.

No graduate student of this institution may be appointed to its graduate faculty nor may a graduate student have primary teaching responsibilities in any graduate course. Under no circumstances may a graduate student be appointed as a member of another graduate student's advisory and examining committee.

#### VI. Satisfactory-Unsatisfactory Course Option

Mr. Eugene Kaelin presented and moved the adoption of the following changes to the Satisfactory-Unsatisfactory Course Option policy (underlining indicates additions; scoring indicates deletions).

With the permission of the major professor or chair-person of the student's major department, a student may enroll in as many as nine quarter hours during the master's degree

program or up to fifteen quarter hours during the doctoral program on a Satisfactory-Unsatisfactory basis. A student's registration under the "S-U" option must be indicated on the proper form to the University Registrar from the major professor or chairperson of the student's major department and eligibility certified by the Office of the Registrar by the end of the official change of schedule period. A student may change to a regular grade (A,B,C...) basis during the first four weeks of the quarter.

The foregoing restrictions on the "S-U" option do not apply to courses normally offered on the basis of the "S-U" grading system, including courses in the College of Law for students of other graduate programs. Such hours are exempt from the total stipulated as permissible in the preceding paragraph.

In individual study, thesis, dissertation, recital, supervised research, and internship credit, as well as for courses taken on the "S-U" option, the assigned grade will be "S" (Satisfactory) or "U" (Unsatisfactory). Although only course hours with a grade of "S" will be credited toward a degree, the "S" and "U" grades are not used in determining grade averages for admission to candidacy or for conferral of a degree.

The motion was seconded and adopted.

VIII. Admission of High School Students to College Courses

Mrs. Betty Piccard, on behalf of the Undergraduate Policy  
Committee, presented and Mr. Martin Roeder moved adoption  
of the following:

Florida public high school students, prepared to undertake  
advanced work not available in the high school curriculum,  
may be permitted to register in college courses for high  
school credit. Although exempt from the payment of  
registration fees, such students will be required to pay  
\$2.80 per hour as required under bond and trust obligations.

High school students will be accepted only upon the recommendation of their principals in courses not available at their high schools, if space is available in the classes. Each class taken by a high school student must be approved by the instructor and the Director of the Division of Basic Studies before registration will be permitted. Certification by the high school must be turned in with the fee card at registration. There is a \$5.00 fee for student identification cards.

The motion was seconded.

Mr. Ralph McWilliams moved to amend the motion by changing the first sentence to read "Florida public high school juniors and seniors having a grade point average of 3.2 or better, prepared to undertake. . .

The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mr. Sanford Safron moved to insert the word "normally" in the first sentence between the words "advanced work not" and "available".

The motion was seconded and ~~adopted~~.

The first sentence as amended: Florida public high school juniors and seniors having a grade point average of 3.2 or better, prepared to undertake advanced work not ~~normally~~ available in the high school. . .

The original motion as amended was adopted.

#### IX. Resolution on Freedom of Speech

Mr. Francis Townsend presented and moved the adoption of the following:

WHEREAS, The Faculty Senate of The Florida State University has consistently defended freedom of speech on this campus; and

WHEREAS, On February 16, 1978, in the Chemistry Lecture Hall, a group of Florida State University students interfered with General William Westmoreland's delivery of a speech: Therefore be it

Resolved, That the Faculty Senate deplores the actions of those students who so interfered.

The motion was seconded.

Mr. Paul Piccard moved the following substitute motion:

WHEREAS, The free exchange of controversial ideas and opinions is essential in a democratic society and is especially critical on a university campus; Therefore be it

Resolved by the Faculty Senate, That the Senate strongly reaffirms its commitment to the rights of freedom of speech, press, and peaceful assembly and strongly condemns any obstruction of these rights.

The motion was seconded and adopted.

X. Report on the State University System Faculty Senate Council Meeting

Mr. Jim Pitts reported on the April meeting held at the University of North Florida. He said that the meeting was dominated by a discussion of proposed modifications to the By-Laws of the SUSFSC as presented by an ad hoc committee from The Florida State University. The present by-laws are vague on whether the SUSFSC represents nine Faculty Senates or is a System's super senate. The eight Senates (University of Florida has withdrawn from the Council) were asked to conduct a straw vote on whether they wish a representative or a University System Senate.

Mr. Martin Roeder moved that the Florida State University Senate go on record as opposed to the SUSFSC functioning as a System's Senate.

The motion was seconded and adopted.

XI. Resolution of the University Sabbatical Committee

Mr. Jim Pitts, on behalf of the Steering Committee, moved the adoption of the following:

"A Faculty Sabbatical Committee shall implement the provision of sabbaticals for faculty as per the agreement between the Board of Regents and the United Faculty of Florida. The Committee shall consist of nine tenured faculty members nominated through the Faculty Senate and elected for staggered two-year terms by the tenured faculty in the spring quarter with the terms of office to begin on July 1."
